Uniform wear is considered essential. As of July 1, 2008, daily uniform wear will be required by all US-based officers. Uniform wear is important to officership, to visibility of the Service, and for your career. It shows respect for your country, your Service, for all who have served in uniform, and for yourself. **Correct** uniform wear shows how much respect you have. This section of the Scientist Handbook is intended inform on locations where an officer can find help on uniform wear and personal appearance.

Alterations are included in the price of pants and skirts (and some other uniform components) ordered through the Navy Exchange. If you order them online, and get the alterations done at a Navy uniform store, they will complete the alterations free of charge (but you must show them your receipt).

October 1, 2007: Officers can wear BDU one day per week as specified by local uniform authority:

January 1, 2008: Navy sweater authorized

January 1, 2008: Beards are not authorized for male officers

Challenges with uniform wear:

Shoulder boards: Avoid “dragging anchor.” Here is the correct orientation for left shoulder boards. If you wear them backwards, you are “dragging anchor.”



Looking sharp: Many officers have sedentary but stressful assignments. As we age, maintaining a “trim” appearance becomes more of a challenge. We should strive to reach/maintain a healthy weight as shown on the chart on the Surgeon General’s Healthy Weight Advice for Consumers:

Q. When do I need to wear a cover (hat)?

A. General rule: If there is no structure between your head and the sky, you need to wear a cover.

Q. Is there one place that has general information on taking care of my uniform?

A. This is a site for Ohio State’s NROTC program. It includes their uniform regulations plus an extra element for each item called “Care and Cleaning.” They recommend Brasso or equivalent for cleaning brass. Some officers like Never Dull, a cotton batting soaked with solvent. All of these products should be used in a well-ventilated area and kept away from children.

A. Some officers have had success with Woolite or pre-soaking using “Shout” or similar stain removers.
